


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**SUPERIOR COURT OF CALIFORNIA

**ORDER**

**IMPLEMENTATION OF EMERGENCY RELIEF**

(Cal. Gov. Code §68115)

Pursuant to the authority provided under California Government Code Section 68115 and as granted in the March 17, 2020 order of Chief Justice Tani G. Cantil-Sakauye, Chair of the Judicial Council of California,

**This Court HEREBY FINDS AND ORDERS AS FOLLOWS:**

1. March 18, 2020 to April 16, 2020, inclusive, for purposes of computing time for filing papers under Code of Civil Procedure Sections 12 and 12(a), are deemed holidays.
2. From March 18, 2020 to April 16, 2020, inclusive, all courtrooms will remain closed for judicial business, except for the following time-sensitive, essential functions:
  - a. Civil Temporary Restraining Orders, including Gun Violence Restraining Orders.
  - b. Domestic Violence Restraining Orders
  - c. Civil Ex Parte Requests for Emergency Relief

- 1 d. Family Ex Parte Proceedings
- 2 e. Hague Convention (International Kidnapping)
- 3 f. Probate Ex Parte Hearings
- 4 g. Emergency Petitions for Temporary Conservatorship
- 5 h. Emergency Petitions for Temporary Guardianship
- 6 i. Mental Health Hearings (Riese, Writ, ECT)
- 7 j. Search Warrants
- 8 k. Arraignments
- 9 l. Criminal Preliminary Hearings
- 10 m. Bail Bond and Cash Bail Processing
- 11 n. Criminal Jury Trials - where there is no consent to continuance and enhanced
- 12 statutory limits as specified below in 4d have been reached
- 13 o. Juvenile Ex Parte Orders
- 14 p. Emergency Orders Relating to the Health and Safety of a Child
- 15 q. Juvenile Restraining Orders
- 16 r. Juvenile Delinquency Detention Hearings and related case processing
- 17 s. Juvenile Dependency Detention Hearings and related case processing
- 18 t. Traffic License Suspensions
- 19 u. Claim of Exemption Hearings, Small Claims
- 20 v. Emergency Writs Challenging COVID-19 Emergency Measures
- 21 w. Writs of Habeas Corpus Challenging Medical Quarantines

22 3. **NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT ALL OTHER MATTERS HAVE**  
23 **BEEN CONTINUED BY THE COURT.** The parties shall receive further notice stating the  
24 specific time and date of the continuance in their cases.

25 4. Pursuant to the authority granted under section 68115 of the Government Code,  
26 the court extends the following deadlines for the period March 18, 2020 to April 16,  
27 2020, inclusive:

- 28 a. Code of Civil Procedure sections 583.310 and 583.320 of the Code of Civil

1 Procedure to bring an action to trial has been extended by **30** days. This  
2 applies only to cases in which the statutory deadline otherwise would  
3 expire from March 18, 2020, to April 16, 2020, inclusive.

4 b. The duration of any temporary restraining order that would otherwise  
5 expire because the emergency condition prevented the court from  
6 conducting proceedings to determine whether the permanent order should  
7 be entered is extended by **15** days. This applies only to cases in which the  
8 statutory deadline otherwise would expire from March 18, 2020, to April  
9 16, 2020, inclusive.

10 c. The court extends the time periods provided in section 859b of the Penal  
11 Code for the holding of a preliminary examination from 10 court days to  
12 not more than **15** court days. This applies only to cases in which the  
13 statutory deadline otherwise would expire from March 18, 2020, to April  
14 16, 2020, inclusive.

15 d. The court extends the time periods provided in section 1382 of the Penal  
16 Code within which a trial must be held by **30** days. This  
17 applies only to cases in which the statutory deadline otherwise would  
18 expire from March 18, 2020, to April 16, 2020, inclusive.

19 e. The court extends the time periods provided in section 825 of the Penal  
20 Code within which a defendant charged with a felony offense must be  
21 taken before a magistrate from 48 hours to no more than seven days. This  
22 applies only to cases in which the statutory deadline otherwise would  
23 expire from March 18, 2020, to April 16, 2020, inclusive.

24 f. The court extends the time periods provided in section 313 of the Welfare  
25 and Institutions Code within which a minor taken into custody pending  
26 dependency proceedings must be released from custody to not more than  
27 seven days. This applies only to minors for whom the statutory deadline  
28 otherwise would expire from March 18, 2020, to April 16, 2020, inclusive.

1 g. The court extends the time periods provided in section 315 of the Welfare  
2 and Institutions Code within which a minor taken into custody pending  
3 dependency proceedings must be given a detention hearing to not more  
4 than seven days. This applies only to minors for whom the statutory  
5 deadline otherwise would expire from March 18, 2020, to April 16, 2020,  
6 inclusive.

7 h. The court extends the time periods provided in sections 632 and 637 of the  
8 Welfare and Institutions Code within which a minor taken into custody  
9 pending wardship proceedings and charged with a felony offense must be  
10 given a detention hearing or rehearing to not more than seven days. This  
11 applies only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would  
12 expire from March 18, 2020, to April 16, 2020, inclusive.

13 i. Extend the time period provided in section 334 of the Welfare and  
14 Institutions Code within which a hearing on a juvenile dependency petition  
15 must be held by not more than 15 days, applicable only to minors for  
16 whom the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from March 18,  
17 2020, to April 16, 2020, inclusive; and

18 j. Extend the time period provided in section 657 of the Welfare and  
19 Institutions Code within which a hearing on a wardship petition for a minor  
20 charged with a felony offense must be held by not more than 15 days,  
21 applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would  
22 expire from March 18, 2020, to April 16, 2020, inclusive.

23 5. Further, the court declares that from March 18, 2020 to April 16, 2020, inclusive,  
24 is deemed a holiday/holidays for purposes of computing time under Code of Civil Procedure 1167  
25 (five-day period within which defendant must respond to a complaint in unlawful detainer  
26 action).

27 6. Further, the court declares that from March 18, 2020 to April 16, 2020, inclusive,  
28 be deemed a holiday/holidays for purposes of computing the time under Code of Civil Procedure

1 116.330(a) (requires a small claims matter to be scheduled for hearing no earlier than 20 days but  
2 not more than 70 days from the date of the order directing the parties to appear at the hearing).

3 7. Any judge of the Court may extend the time periods provided in §§583.310 and  
4 583.320 of the Code of Civil Procedure to bring an action to trial by not more than 30 days,  
5 applicable only to cases in which the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from March 18,  
6 2020 to April 16, 2020, inclusive.

8 **THIS ORDER IS EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY AND WILL REMAIN IN**  
9 **EFFECT UNTIL APRIL 16, 2020. THIS ORDER MAY BE AMENDED AS**  
10 **CIRCUMSTANCES REQUIRE.**
